# Recipe

## Anzac Slices - Fiona Curthoys



### INGREDIENTS


- 1 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 cup rolled oats
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 2/3 cup Desiccated coconut (unsweetened) OR pumpkin and/or sunflower seeds
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/4 cup Golden Syrup (honey or maple syrup can be used as substitutes)
- 2 Tbsp warm water
- 1 tsp baking soda

# METHOD

1. Pre-heat oven to 350 F
2. Mix the Dry ingredients: In a large bowl mix flour, oats and sugar (1) (2)
3. Mix the wet ingredients: Add butter and syrup to a pan over medium heat and stir for two minutes or until butter has melted
4. In a small bowl or cup, mix the warm water and baking soda then add the mixture to the melted butter and syrup and stir. The mixture will become frothy. This is what you want.
5. Pour the butter mixture over the dry ingredients and mix until just combined
6. Scrape mixture into a greased 7" x 11" pan and bake for 15 minutes or until golden. Watch carefully.
7. Remove from the oven and allow to cool
8. Cut into slices and store in an airtight container.
9. Refrigerate for 5 days or freeze for up to 2 months

## Notes


- (1) Add 1 tsp of baking soda here as well for 'lighter' bars
- (2) Any nut or seed or even dried fruit can be added depending on what you have. Small-ish pieces work best.

# **CBCYC and Marine Park Forever delegate Graham Rankine**

I've been boating most of my life. My earliest memories in the 60's are at my Grandparents summer camp at Hoodpoint on Bowen Island where we had small boats that we fished and crabbed from. Later my parents got the family into sailing day sailors starting with a 16' then to a 20' and finally a Tanzer 22 during this time we also had a Laser to sail. My first fulltime job was with the Canadian Hydrographic Service on the East Coast, where I got to live and work on survey vessels. This included surveys in the Bay of Fundy, parts of Newfoundland and Labrador as well as a trip to the arctic.

After relocating back to the West Coast I finally bought my first boat, a Bayfield 32C, which allowed me to start exploring the west coast with trips from Victoria to Desolation Sound. We did a number of upgrades and repairs while we had the boat and looked at doing a number more but decided it would make sense to purchase a newer boat that had what we wanted. The next boat was a Catalina 34C that enabled a number of amazing trips, including the Broughtons. Although we enjoyed sailing, it was a bit of a challenge with work schedules and the wind typically going the wrong direction.

Early retirement in 2017 had us moving to the Island and finding a place in Saltair. The plan was to continue sailing, with a long term goal of moving to power boat. Due to delayed renovations, we went to the Sidney boat show and found a Grand Banks 42 Europa that met our requirements. After a bit of discussion, we moved up. I have done a number of upgrades, including solar, lithium batteries, and a high output alternator. These changes have allowed us to sit for a number of days without using the generator. We have also done a trip to the Central Coast as far as Ocean Falls and around King Island. There are so many places to see and lots of historical places to visit.
